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# ISSUE

## Background Story: Helping Students with Disabilities to Access Postsecondary Education

Postsecondary education is associated with better employment outcomes for all students and research shows that the same is true for students with disabilities. In 2014, a study focused on 19,050 youth with intellectual disability between the ages of 16 and 26 to compare employment and earnings outcomes between those who did and did not participate in postsecondary education (PSE). All students received Vocational Rehabilitation (VR) services. The study showed that the youth who participated in PSE were exited VR services with higher rates of employment than the youth who did not participate in PSE. The youth who participated in PSE also earned higher wages than those who did not participate in PSE (Smith et al., 2018).

Outcomes for Youths with Intellectual Disability	Number of Youth	Employment	Weekly Wages
Did Not Receive PSE Services	16,672 (88%)	55.9%	\$200
Received PSE Services	577 (3%)	60.7%	\$288
Information Missing	1801 (9%)	-	-

However, the data shows that 88% of the youth did not participate in PSE services while only 3% did participate in PSE services. Access to PSE is greatly needed for more students with disabilities, particularly those with intellectual disability (ID). CCT Clubs encourage and support students to participate in postsecondary education which can increase their opportunities to find preferred employment at higher wages.



#### Florida College and Career Transition (CCT) Clubs: Helping Students to Find PSE Opportunities

Florida CCT Clubs are supported by the Florida Center for Students with Unique Abilities (FCSUA) at the University of Central Florida (UCF). The purpose of the CCT Clubs is to increase awareness of Florida Postsecondary Comprehensive



Transition Program opportunities and help students with intellectual disabilities prepare for and access those opportunities across Florida. CCT Clubs and are inclusive, with membership representing these three

groups: (1) students with intellectual disabilities, (2) students with disabilities other than intellectual disabilities and (3) students without disabilities. Club advisors support students to learn and explore career pathways and postsecondary education options. Students work together to identify and explore college and career opportunities, engage in mentoring and participate in events and activities within the school, community and at local Institutions of Higher Education (IHE) to build college and career transition plans for all members.

#### **Seven CCT Club Student Learning Outcomes**

Club activities are interactive and fun while also accomplishing crucial learning outcomes associated with postsecondary education. These seven learning outcomes are aimed at equipping students with the skills they need to identify their career preferences, find postsecondary education opportunities that prepare them for their profession of interest, complete the necessary steps to apply to postsecondary education institutions and develop the interpersonal and intrapersonal skills needed to thrive in an academic and/or employment setting. The seven student learning outcomes are listed below.



#### Students will:

- 1. Identify three careers or career fields in which they are interested, and the competencies needed to pursue those careers.
- 2. Identify pathways to each career through secondary and postsecondary education, training and/or other experiential learning.
- Identify postsecondary education institutions that offer programs aligned with the careers they have identified and will compare the characteristics of each institution.
- 4. Identify the individual supports, if any, they need to access and succeed in each career and in the postsecondary education associated with each career.
- 5. Identify the three characteristics most important to them when choosing a career and a postsecondary education program.
- Demonstrate the ability to accurately complete a postsecondary education application; prepare a resume and/or summary of performance relevant to college and career applications; and develop effective interviewing skills.
- 7. Develop and demonstrate employability and leadership skills aligned with their academic and career aspirations, such as teamwork, goal setting, organization, decision-making, task completion and communication.

When students accomplish these learning outcomes, they have the tools they need to transition to postsecondary education and, ultimately, to a career.

#### Accomplishing Good Things While Having Good Fun

A high school club is the perfect setting to achieve the seven student learning outcomes because most of the activities involve interacting with others. As a

group, the students learn new skills and learn from each other. Club members may find their learning taking place:

- On their school campus or on a college campus.
- Using computers or participating in community service.
- Listening and talking to each other or listening and talking to a guest speaker.

Whether the club members are on a road trip, conducting virtual campus tours, investigating career options and requirements, preparing for or participating in mock interviews, volunteering in the community, or enjoying team building activities, they are preparing for postsecondary education and careers.



#### Here's How to Create a CCT Club at YOUR School

FCSUA can provide funding in the amount of \$3,000 per year to cover CCT Club activities and a club sponsor beginning as early as September 1, 2021.
