Florida IPSE Credential Guidance Brief: #3 Exploring Existing Credentials

The Florida Inclusive Postsecondary Education (IPSE) Credential Guidance Brief Series is comprised of a set of six stand-alone briefs developed by the **Florida Consortium on Inclusive Higher Education (FCIHE)** and a small workgroup, in consultation with a statewide steering committee. These briefs were written to provide guidance to Florida stakeholders regarding credential development for Inclusive Postsecondary Education (IPSE) programs for students with intellectual disability (ID).

AUDIENCE: These briefs are intended to be used for

- 1) college and university faculty and staff planning to build or expand sustainable and rigorous IPSE programs,
- 2) families and educators exploring and comparing IPSE programs; and
- 3) community agency and school district personnel to increase program understanding, recognition, credibility and increased options for individuals with ID.

A meaningful program credential is required to become a federally recognized **Comprehensive Transition and Postsecondary Program (CTP)** and a Florida recognized **Florida Postsecondary Comprehensive Transition Program (FPCTP)**. Credentials also increase students' employment outcomes and career opportunities in multiple ways. For example, credentials enable businesses to identify a student's expected skill sets upon program completion and to recognize credentialed applicants as qualified applicants. Credentials earned through IPSE programs or typical degree-seeking programs, *and* sponsored by the college or university, represent valid and rigorous programs of study. These Credential Guidance Briefs have a number of Florida-specific points of information as they were written for Florida, though families, program staff, and faculty outside of Florida, may find the general IPSE information useful as well.

ABOUT THIS BRIEF: In this **IPSE Credential Guidance Brief: # 3 Exploring Existing Credentials** the reader will find examples of credentials with corresponding programs of study for each of three programs of study *types* currently found in Florida; **Liberal Arts, Career and Technical, and Transitional**. The guidelines for awarding credentials are often unique to each institution of higher education (IHE). Credentials may be awarded by colleges, departments, or divisions within the IHE. This brief shares with practitioners, families, and students, the credentials that currently exist in Florida, both within a specific career field as well as at an IHE and the requisite program of study for each. More information on programs of study may be found in the second brief in this series, **#2 Programs of Study**.

A caveat to bear in mind: IPSE is a new, exciting, and evolving field with rapid changes and updates to programs. Use this document as a guide, but seek out each IHE for the most current information.

Liberal Arts Type Credentials

The **Liberal Arts** program of study type describes IPSE programs that provide students with a generally large array of courses, dictated by student interests and culminating in an individualized career-focused course of study and certificate. This program of study provides students with the widest degree of latitude and ability to explore familiar and not-so-familiar topics of interest and are generally found at universities and state colleges.

Examples of two Florida IHE's Liberal Arts type credentials are presented in the shaded boxes below and followed by the IHE's program of study for the identified credential.

Example 1**University of Central Florida's Inclusive Education Services****Professional Services Credentials**

UCF developed a credential with three (3) high-demand career-focused paths for their IPSE students and in collaboration with the division of **Continuing Education**, the **College of Community Innovation and Education**, and the **Office of Student Accessibility Services**. Each earned credential is

- individualized to the student's chosen career path from (Hospitality, Education, and Social Work/Social Sciences),
- based on regional labor market survey results aligning 3 high employee-demand fields with 3 of UCF's areas of unique strengths, and
- comprised of five-semesters totaling 42 credential units of audited UCF college courses, co-curricular activities, and internships.

Example 2

Tallahassee Community College (TCC) - Eagle Connections

Employment Credential

TCC developed a credential with 5 optional career-focused pathways in collaboration with the **Office of Student Accessibility Services, Career Services** and **Workforce Development** that provides a course of study that, in addition to college courses, includes career exploration, work experience, and social activities. Each earned credential is

- individualized to the student's chosen pathway of the 5 pathways offered through the college (Arts, Humanities, Communication and Design; Business; Science, Technology, Engineering and Math; Education; and Social and Behavioral Sciences and Human Sciences),
- based on top skills sought by employers, and
- comprised of 33 credential units of audited TCC college courses and a capstone internship.

Career and Technical Education Type Credentials

The **Career and Technical Education (CTE)** program of study type refers to IPSE programs that offer specific knowledge and skills in one or more of seventeen (17) careers or career clusters. Students may earn full or partial industry requirements leading to full industry certification and/or discrete certifications. This program of study serves students who have already identified a chosen career path and provides the largest array of industry recognized certifications. These programs are geared toward middle school, high school, technical college, and Florida college system students throughout the state. With the help of partners in education, business, industry, and trade associations, each program includes the academic and technical skills required to be successful in today's economy.

Career Education credentials can be earned through a number of avenues, including Adult Education and Continuing Education and are primarily found at state and technical colleges and some universities. Different from the Liberal Arts programs of study, most CTE programs of study require credit-bearing or clock-hour (rather than audited) coursework.

What follows are three CTE programs of study examples from two of Florida's IHE's. Due to the intended brevity of this document, the entirety of CTE programs of study cannot be presented here. The CTE type credentials are presented in the shaded boxes below (Examples 3-5) and followed by the program of study for each identified credential.

Example 3

The College of The Florida Keys (CFK) Project ACCESS

National Retail Federation's Customer Service and Sales (CSS) Industry Certification

Project ACCESS is a CFK comprehensive transition and postsecondary program (CTP) for students with intellectual disabilities (ID), learning disabilities (LD) and autism. This program prepares students with the noted disabilities, over a 1-year period, to complete an individualized, CTE curriculum resulting in an initial and foundational **National Retail Federation's Customer Service and Sales (CSS) Industry Certification**. Upon successful achievement of this foundational certificate, students may continue to add fields of study and industry certifications taking 1-2 additional years. As an inclusive postsecondary education program, Project ACCESS prepares students with intellectual and developmental disabilities for integrated competitive employment in their chosen career and supports student success through on-campus transition services including person-centered planning and individualized supports.

The mission of Project ACCESS is to support students who are seeking to continue academic, career and technical, and independent living instruction at CFK in order to prepare them for integrated competitive employment. Project ACCESS utilizes comprehensive and structured program of study that prepares students for success in their college academics, social activities, employment experiences, and self-determined choices in their work, living, and social environments.

Example 4

Florida State College of Jacksonville (FSCJ) VERTICAL

See Certification options below

FSCJ offers inclusive postsecondary CTE training to eligible IPSE program students. Students enroll in one of the CTE certificate programs offered at the college, and receive support services, individualized to their needs, to support their academic, technical, and employment skills needed to succeed in the competitive workforce. These clock- hour programs must be taken for credit to achieve the industry certificate.

The length of program and number of clock- or credit-hours varies for each program of study. Students receive accommodations by disclosing their disability and requesting services through student support services. Students receive supplemental instruction through participating in weekly job club meetings. Program of study details for two (2) of the most popular programs (Automotive Collision Technology and Facial Specialty) are included below.

Minor Certifications through Adult and Continuing Education

Florida's Adult Education system includes a range of instructional programs that help adults get the basic skills they need to be productive workers, family members, and citizens. The major program areas are Adult Basic Education, Adult High School and GED® Preparation, and English for Speakers of Other Languages (ESOL). These programs emphasize basic skills such as reading, writing, math, and English language competency. Adult education programs also help adult learners gain the knowledge and skills they need to enter and succeed in postsecondary education.

Continuing Workforce Education, or Continuing Education, is another option that provides access to an extensive selection of noncredit courses that can lead to a new and exciting career. Continuing education courses are non-credit courses for professional development, career advancement or personal enrichment and may include minor certifications such as CPR, First Aid, or Red Carpet Customer. These minor certifications, no less important in many industries, often are acquired in a relatively short timeframe, such as a few hours or a one-day course.

Questions to Consider...when collaborating with an Adult or Continuing Education Department toward offering a credential may include:

1. Is this course/program open to any student?
2. Is there a credential aligned with a course/program?

Transitional Type Credentials

The **Transitional** program of study type describes IPSE programs of study “that reflect a convergence of life skills required to successfully transition to adult life, such as independence, interdependence, employability, self-determination, health and fitness, and/or civic participation rather than a specific field or career” (Becht et. al., in press). Students take more academically specialized courses and typically fewer academically inclusive courses, in this program of study, providing more intentional adult-oriented life skills than broad academic or career-focused knowledge.

An example of one of Florida IHE’s Transitional type credentials is presented in the shaded box below and followed by the IHE’s program of study for the identified credential.

Example 5

Florida Atlantic University’s Academy for Community Inclusion (ACI) offers three (3) specialized certificates approved by the Board of Governors, and earned through completion of 24 course credits. High school graduates who have intellectual and/or developmental disabilities (I/DD) are eligible to apply. ACI is a 2-year (6 semester) full-time and credit earning college program from which students have the option of earning one or more of three certificates in : 1) supported employment, 2) supported community access, and 3) supported community living. ACI students are college students with IDs, who attend college classes on both the Jupiter and Boca Raton campuses, may purchase meal plans, and participate in FAU activities, clubs, events, and organizations with their fellow FAU students. The ACI Supported Employment program of study follows below.

Acronyms, Terms, & Resources

APSE: APSE, the Association of People Supporting Employment First, is the only national organization with an exclusive focus on integrated employment and career advancement opportunities for individuals with disabilities.

Competitive Integrated Employment: Competitive Integrated Employment (CIE), real work for real pay is the gold standard of transition outcomes for students with disabilities. The work should align with the post-school employment goals of the student and is the desired transition outcome for all students with disabilities who choose to work, regardless of disability or needed accommodations or support. CIE should be a realistic and desirable expectation for all students.

CTP: Comprehensive Transition and Postsecondary Program; a set of federal guidelines, set out in HEOA of 2008, that defines an inclusive postsecondary education program for individuals with intellectual disability. Students attending institutions of higher education, who apply for and receive CTP approval, may access specific Federal Student Aid. Employment First: Employment First, means that employment in the general workforce should be the first and preferred option for individuals with disabilities receiving assistance from publicly funded systems. Simply put, Employment First means real jobs, real wages. See <http://www.employmentfirstfl.org/> for more Florida specific information.

HEOA: Higher Education Opportunity Act (2008)

ID: Intellectual disability is characterized by significant limitations in both intellectual functioning and adaptive behavior, which covers many everyday social and practical skills. This disability originates before the age of 18. Generally, an IQ test score 70 or below indicates an intellectual disability.

IHE: Institution of higher education, a university, state, or technical college

IPSE: Inclusive Postsecondary Education Program; enrollment in an on-campus college program, in which students with intellectual disability attend academically inclusive college courses, engage in campus clubs and activities with their peers without disability, increase personal development and life skills, earn a career focused credential with the goal of integrated competitive employment upon graduation.

PCP: Person-Centered Planning; for more information go to <http://project10.info/Star.php>

PoS: Program of Study; the required courses, internships, and activities a student must complete to earn the credential.

SAP: Satisfactory Academic Progress; the successful accomplishment of a set of expectations for the IHE and/or Program of Study in which the student is enrolled. Accomplishment of SAP is required to retain state and federal scholarships and/or financial aid eligibility.

TPSID: A federal discretionary program to increase and enhance inclusive postsecondary education for students with intellectual disability. Transition and Postsecondary Programs for Students with Intellectual Disability. See www.FCIHE.com for a list of Florida's TPSID programs and contacts.

TRIO: is a title for a group of federal outreach and student services programs designed to identify and provide services for individuals from disadvantaged backgrounds and includes Upward Bound, Talent Search, /student Support Services, Educational Opportunity Centers, R.E.
