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Buzzworthy Improvement: Graduation Statistics for Students with Disabilities

First, let's talk "big picture". In 2006-07, the graduation rate for students with disabilities was 39%. In 2016-17 the graduation rate for students with disabilities rose to 66%. A 27% increase in graduates is a something to celebrate. What a difference a decade makes!

Now let's zoom in on the details. The improvements in graduation rates that we've seen in the past decade didn't happen with one giant brushstroke. They happened in daily increments of dedication, attentiveness and hard work from teachers, district personnel, students, families, communities and related agencies, who all contributed in big and small ways to higher graduation rates for students with disabilities.

So, pat yourself on the back. Remember that your hard work is making a difference. Store away that positive energy as you contemplate the growth that lies ahead, such as the following:

- Continue to increase the number of students with disabilities to graduate from high school.
- Decrease the graduation gap between all students and students with disabilities.



- Ensure that Individual Education Plans (IEPs) are soundly designed to successfully guide students through high school and on to postseco
- students through high school and on to postsecondary activities.
- Increase the number of students who are engaged in post-school activities such as training, postsecondary education and competitive employment.

Project 10 Technical Assistance: Support for Improving Graduation and Dropout Rates

Three key areas of technical assistance are to assist school and district personnel in working with the following:

- Improve data collection, analysis and data-driven decision-making
- Develop an early warning system to support and monitor student progress toward graduation

Project 10 Professional Development and Training: Support for Improving Graduation and Dropout Rates

Project 10 also promotes best practices in transition through professional development and training. Two Project 10 trainings recommended to assist school and district personnel to improve graduation and dropout rates are as follows:

Using School-level Data to Increase Graduation Success of Students with Disabilities: An Early Warning System (EWS)

This training details how schools and districts can use EWS data to promote timely graduation and post-school success. This training includes information on how to access and utilize data to impact graduation rates at the school level and interventions to help students graduate. In addition, effective practices implemented in other districts across the state will be shared. (2-3 hours)

This training is also available through an online course available at Project 10's Online Training webpage.

It's T.I.M.E. for Dynamic Dropout Prevention: Scaling up Student Engagement and School Climate for Student Success

This training reviews federal uniform graduation and dropout rate calculations, explains strategies to increase student engagement that result in decreased dropout rates (e.g., EWS) and describes dropout withdrawal codes including helpful hints on locating and re-engaging students who have dropped out. (2-3 hours)

Re-Charging Your Batteries

"Even the best work can wear us down" (Eva, 2018). The anecdotal evidence of our personal experiences support this statement. The work we do to assist students with

disabilities to transition effectively to postschool life is meaningful and purposeful and, yet, sometimes we get weary. In an online article in *Greater Good Magazine*, Amy L. Eva (2018) offers suggestions for renewing inspiration and purpose. The following is a summary of Eva's recommendations:

- Revisit your story: Remind yourself of why you became involved in your work.
 Remember how your work has positively impacted students.
- Reflect on your favorite mentor: Recall the reasons that caused you to admire and respect your mentor and how this person impacted the professional you have become.



- Connect with colleagues: None of us can accomplish this work alone. We need each other for formal and informal support.
- Prioritize your well-being: Educators are notoriously known to prioritize the needs of others above their own, but studies show that you need good self-care to be at your best.
- Create a resilience plan: Because resilience is an ongoing, dynamic process of adaptation and growth, you can choose to develop a plan that cultivates it. Checkout this <u>article</u> on developing resilience for some ideas about how to foster resilience within yourself.
