

Youth with Disabilities in Foster Care



Juvenile Law Center has developed tools to help youth with disabilities, child welfare professionals and advocates as they plan for the transition to adulthood from the child welfare system. This planning tool was developed for child welfare workers and advocates to use to guide planning for youth with disabilities in the child welfare system from age 14 to 21. It highlights key issues to address as youth with special needs are preparing for and making the transition to adulthood. The Juvenile Law Center also features planning tools for transition for both practitioners and youth.
